I would also request that someone publishes an account of how much of the land that Encana has reclaimed & rehabilitated for wildlife. They should not be allowed an additional area before their current project is completed and restored.

I am against winter drilling and believe the BLM needs to slow things down and plan for phased development.

How much more can the wildlife, environment and people of Sublette County withstand.
